Help us not forget our Source,



Praying with Scripture: Lectio Divina

Isaiah 65:17-25 (New Revised Standard Version)

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind.

But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating, for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy and its people as a delight.

I will rejoice in Jerusalem and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it or the cry of distress.

No more shall there be in it an infant who lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime, for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth, and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed.

They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit.

They shall not build and another inhabit; they shall not plant and another eat, for like the days of a tree shall the days of my people be, and my chosen shall long enjoy the work of their hands.

They shall not labor in vain or bear children for calamity, for they shall be offspring blessed by GOD-and their descendants as well.

Before they call I will answer, while they are yet speaking I will hear.

The wolf and the lamb shall feed together; the lion shall eat straw like the ox, but the serpent--its food shall be dust! They shall not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain, says GOD.

Praying with Scripture: Lectio Divina

- 1. **READ:** After an initial prayer for openness to God, begin by reading slowly. Stop or make note when a word or phrase or image seems to touch you. The intent is not to get to the end of the passage but to the bottom of it in God.
- 2. **REFLECT:** Use your cognitive capacity to reflect on the possible meaning of the word for your life, and at times for the larger community's life. Understanding may emerge over time if there is something important for you to know.
- 3. **PRAY:** for your heart to open to God and for your will to respond to God's call to action.
- 4. **CONTEMPLATE:** Move to stillness. Absorb insights in silence without active thinking.

"Community is first and foremost a gift of the Holy Spirit, not built upon mutual compatibility, shared affection, or common interests but upon having received the same divine breath, having been given a heart set aflame by the same divine love." - Henri Nouwen

As a community, we are exploring different forms of contemplative practice. A month ago we had a Taizé service, using collective singing to deepen our communion with God. Today we are exploring other forms of contemplative practice, one of which is contemplative prayer.

Unlike verbal prayer, or prayers of intercession, contemplative prayer is wordless and practiced in silence.

Silence can be intimidating. Scary even. But for Christian contemplatives it is by intentionally sitting together in silence that we create space for connection to the Divine. Contemplative silence is not empty. It is full of wisdom when we listen in stillness.

In contemplative silence we are rooted in the body, open in the heart, quiet in the mind.

In silence we create space for the wordless, for the invisible. We learn to take our focus off our thoughts, words, ideas – even the good, humble and noble ones - and create space for what is there underneath the words.

It is in silence that we get in touch with the stirrings of our soul. We make room for the still small voice that wants to connect with us.

Contemplative silence is not an escape from life. It is a deep form of participation. It allows the soul to breathe, to respond rather than react, and to discover that prayer, like love, matures slowly through fidelity and surrender.

When we grow still, we begin to see differently. Trees, people, and moments simply are what they are—each carrying its own grace. We learn that all places are sacred, that nothing lies outside the circle of belonging. In this awareness, the present becomes our teacher, repairing the past and preparing the future.

To live this way is to trust the slow work of transformation, to rest in the truth that God has never been absent.
